The Great Backyard Bird Count

What mid-winter activity is fun, easy, free, and helps bird conservation? What can parents and teachers do with children that connects them to a whole new world of natural wonders? This February, the tenth annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), sponsored by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, will give everyone a chance to discover the birds in their neighborhood and "Count for the Record."

During February 16-19, 2007, people of all ages, from beginners to experts, are invited to join this event which spans all of the United States and Canada. Participants can take part wherever they are - at home, at school, at local parks or wildlife refuges. Observers simply count the highest number of each species they see during an outing or a sitting, and enter their tally on the Great Backyard Bird Count web site at www.birdsource.org/gbbc.

Visitors to the web site can also compare their sightings with results from other participants, as checklists pour in from throughout the U.S. and Canada. Together, these counts offer a real-time snapshot of the numbers and kinds of birds that people are finding, from Boreal Chickadees in Alaska to Anhingas in Florida.

We often fail to notice how rich our surroundings are, but counting birds is not only educational - it can provide a lasting source of enjoyment, turning a daily walk into a treasure hunt.

ATTENTION RETIREES

The Pension Protection Act of 2006, signed by President Bush on August 17, contains a provision called Qualified Charitable Distributions. It allows persons 70 1/2 or older to donate to a qualified charity from an IRA distribution and pay no income tax on it. You can take advantage of this provision even if you don't itemize deductions on your income tax returns.

As with all tax laws, there are many details to consider, so be sure to consult with your financial advisor. But please keep Wichita Audubon and Chaplin Nature Center in mind. You can help us and help yourself, too. This provision is only authorized for 2006 and 2007 unless extended by Congress.

NEW DISPLAYS FOR CNC

Shawn and the Chaplin Nature Center Committee have contracted with the Kauffman Museum in North Newton to design and build new educational displays for the visitor's center at Chaplin Nature Center. Kauffman Museum has extensive experience and expertise in exhibit design and construction, and Bob Regier, a long-time member of Wichita Audubon, is part of their team.

The CNC committee has been brainstorming ideas for months, and after several meetings the Kauffman team is now working on the plans. One feature will be exhibits that will be changed seasonally, so that visitors will see new things on repeat visits. Wichita Audubon has received a grant of \$1069 from the National Audubon Society for this project.
