The January program will be presented by Gregg Friesen, who will tell us about the Western Meadowlark, the icon of the short grass prairie. Selected as the state bird of a host of western states, its bold colored pattern and melodious voice lend a unique voice to an often arid landscape. Through the voices of past orgnithologists, explorers and others, this program provides a brief glimpse into the life and story of the bird chosen to represent the state of Kansas.

Gregg is a psychiatric nurse at Prairie View in Newton, but his hobby and passion is birding. He has been a long-time active member in the Kansas Ornithological Society.

Ted Cable will transport us to the ancient city of Timbuktu where we will learn about the colorful history of the city whose name has come to represent the most remote and unattainable place on the planet. We will see the common birds of Timbuktu and we will earn about the last remaining herd of desert elephants - the region's most significant and critically endangered species.

Ted T. Cable is Professor of Park Management and Conservation in the Department of Horticulture, Forestry and Recreation Resources at Kansas State

University. He has authored 13 books, several book chapters and scenic byway video scripts, and more than 200 articles, reports, and presentations dealing birds, travel, and heritage interpretation. Dr. Cable has traveled in all 50 states and worked in Africa, Asia and Latin America.


COUNT


Bring the whole family and have a good time regardless of the weather. We'll be there from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

CALLING ALL GOOSE COUNTERS!

The 32nd Annual Migratory Survey is coming up in January. This is a count of all the Canada Geese (including Cackling Geese) in the Wichita Metropolitan area. This count is conducted every winter to determine the number of wintering geese, and again in the summer to determine the breeding population. Dr. Alan Maccarone of Friends University is the organizer. Volunteers are divided into ten groups, each with their own area, and spend the afternoon counting geese. Here are the particulars:.

WICHITA CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The Wichita Christmas bird count was held December 14. Things started out cloudy, breezy and cold, but it sure was good to have the sun by late morning. The species total of 91 (plus one count week species) was well below the 10-year average.

Although most small ponds were still completely frozen, waterfowl numbers were fairly average. Exceptions included a low number of Canada Goose (13,301) and Northern Shoveler (53) but record high counts of Wood Duck (122) and Common Merganser (186). Notable species included a Hermit Thrush, an Orange-crowned Warbler and 2 Pine Warblers. Notable misses included Common Grackle and Brown-headed Cowbird,





and the noticeable absence of certain species chased out by the recent cold snap, as well

as a few other species that are getting more difficult to find in this increasingly urban count circle.

A big thanks to all the participants, and to Laura Groeneweg for providing our chili supper for the compilation.
