On Friday, April 29, they visited Oxley Nature Center in Tulsa and also hit Sequoyah National Wildlife Refuge on their way

> to Isabel, OK. They had over 80 species for the day. Friday they dodged most of the rain, but did need boots and jackets. They started the morning with David Arbour, a Biologist with the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, at Red Slough. He showed them two Fulvous Whistling Ducks, life birds for most. Common Gallinule, and Least Bittern. In the afternoon the real rains hit, forcing the group inside.

Day three was great. The storm blew through overnight and the weather was nice. The river was high, so access to the Little River National Wildlife Refuge was limited but they still found most of the warblers they wanted. There were good looks at the Swanson's Warbler and the Kentucky. They also found a couple of cool snakes, lifers for Eddie. On the way home, some stopped at Broken Bow Lake and had excellent close-up looks at Pine Warblers. The group included Tom Ewert, Dennice Craig, Bev Dugay, Harry Gregory, Terry & Sam Mannell, Ernie Misek, Atcha Nolan, Eddie Stegall, Curt VanBoening, and Helen Winter. Birdathon

This year we had three Birdathon teams that raised more than \$5,000!

The Painted Buntings team included Dennice Craig, Carol Cumberland and Patty Marlett. They had a perfect day with bright sunshine and no wind. They started at the Derby boat launch with good looks at their name

sake, the Painted Bunting, plus a cooperative Yellow-throated Vireo. Birds were singing everywhere. After a stop at the Yellow-crowned Night Heron colony on Larry Lane it was on to Oak Park. The best bird there was a Chestnut-sided Warbler. Then off to Quivera NWR, which was pretty slow - not many ducks and too much water for shorebirds, but thousands of Wilson's Phalaropes were whirling around.

Late in the afternoon they headed for

Cheyenne Bottoms and found the missing shorebirds. The day ended watching Upland Sandpipers in a prairie dog town with 138 species for their efforts.

This year the CNC team consisted of Rex Herndon, Dwight Shoup, Gene Young, Kevin Groeneweg and Travis Ross. They began at 3:30 pm on Friday at Slate Creek Church. Before they even stepped out of their cars they heard the first bird of the count singing — the Dickcissel. They then headed east to the Winfield Gun Club

Property, then over to the south marsh and along the way found a Bobolink on 80th Rd. It was now a little before 6 p.m., so to avoid a strong storm cell bearing down on them they headed up to Oxford. They found Wally Champeny by the Oxford Mill where he had been seeing a Lazuli Bunting. While there they added several more species and finally at 7:30 the Lazuli showed up. They then went to the Rainbow Bridge to listen for owls. It was not until 9:15 that they finally heard a Barn Owl in an abandoned house. That was the last bird of the day. In

the first 6 hours they had 94 species. The next morning the first stop was in the Whispering Oaks neighborhood, then on their usual route down the road past Camp Horizon to the Kaw WMA boat ramp. At Kaw Lake a lot of water was being released into the spillway, causing a feeding frenzy for hundreds of Franklin's Gulls and

several heron species and a few pelicans and cormorants. On a sand spit were several shorebirds, including three Willets. They ended the day cruising Cowley County roads, finding a Grasshopper Sparrow and a couple of flocks of Bobolinks.

Their total number of species (126) was lower than previous years, but still a good result.

Wichita Audubon Birdathon Harvey County team scored 108 birds. Gregg Friesen, Rod Wedel, Ernie Misek and Tom Ewert started at 6:30 a.m. with the Kauffman Museum bird walk along with

twenty other folks. Then they headed out to Harvey County Park West, Greenfield, Patterson and other marshes, back to Newton for an afternoon break, out to Harvey County Park East, Osage nature trails, a couple private farms, 14th St. wetlands, Mission prairie, back out to Greenfield marsh and ending the day back at Harvey County

Park West where they listened to four Barred Owls calling back and forth.

Best birds were multiple bobolinks in at least three locations, including an amazing 45 seen by Rod Wedel north of the Newton airport, Hudsonian godwits at the 14th Street wetlands and a mud puddle south of Halstead.
