BAD BILLS PILE ON THE CLEAN AIR ACT

Congressman Fred Upton (R-MI) started his attack on the Clean Air Act when he introduced his "Dirty Air Act" bill, quickly followed by a day-long hearing. His bill includes a sweeping rollback of the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) authority to regulate power plant pollution and protect public health. In the Senate, Senator James Inhofe (R-OK) has introduced companion legislation, joining two other bills in that chamber that also hamstring EPA's ability to do its job.

These radical legislative proposals favor corporate polluters over American families and a healthy environment. At stake is EPA's ability to increase protections to public health from pollutants such as:

- * Mercury—this heavy metal accumulates in the tissues of wildlife and humans alike causing reproductive, behavioral and neurological problems. One in six U.S. women has enough mercury in her body to be a potential risk to her baby, should she become pregnant.
- * Soot—fine particulates that are drawn deep into our lungs, soot is implicated as one of the causes of cardiovascular disease.
- * Carbon dioxide—one of the key greenhouse gases responsible for climate change, carbon dioxide has been determined to be a health threat by EPA and the agency is moving to regulate emissions from both mobile (cars and trucks) and large stationary (factories, utilities) sources.
- * Sulfur and Nitrogen oxides—the main culprits in acid rain, serious steps were taken in the 1990 CAA amendments to reduce these pollutants with a beneficial outcome for a number of east coast streams and lakes. EPA seeks to ratchet down these pollutants even further to better protect habitat and human health.
- * Ozone—ground-level ozone is a chief component of smog and causes respiratory problems, particularly for the elderly, children, and asthmatics. Even healthy individuals are warned to curtail activity during high smog alerts in urban environments.

It is the single biggest attack on the Clean Air Act in its 40-year history and defending the Act is one of Audubon's highest priorities. Your continued support is needed to defend this landmark environmental law.

IN MEMORIAM

Long time Audubon member Geula McDonald died January 29. Geula and her husband Nathan joined Wichita Audubon in the 1950's and were active and influential members for more than forty years. Geula was a member

of the committee that negotiated the purchase of the Chaplin property for our nature center, but for the most part was content to let Nathan hold offices and serve on committees, while she was hostess and greeter. Her cheerful smile and Arkansas voice made everyone feel welcome. Her bubbly enthusiasm couldn't be beat, and no one was a stranger around her.

Geula was the second recipient of our Meritorious Service Award in 1995 for her valuable contributions. She was also famous for her persimmon cookies, another legacy from Arkansas.

She died at age 99, her last few years spent at Larksfield Place. Her family has established a memorial with Wichita Audubon.
