# March Meeting

Due to the continuing dangers of Coronavirus, the board has decided that all our programs through May will be online.

Vickie Cikanek will present "Life History and Current Status of Prairie Chicken in KS," for our March meeting.

Greater and Lesser Prairie chicken are an iconic symbol of the Kansas prairie. Their mating habits alone make them a must-see when visiting the great plains, but there is so much more to their lives than what goes on in the spring. They have been coined by some as umbrella species of the central plains, and it is because of that there has been a lot of concern over their population statuses across their range over the last 10 years. This program will give more details into all of this and more!

Vickie is currently a District Wildlife Biologist with Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks. She spent 4 years working around Wilson Lake

and the last 3 years working in the Southern Flint hills. Prior to that, she held several seasonal or temporary field positions doing bird surveys on the Rio Grande in New Mexico, trapping game animals on Fort Bragg in North Carolina, and trapping and tracking Greater Prairie Chicken in the Flint Hills of Kansas. She is originally from northern Delaware. She received her bachelor's degree from Colorado State

University in Wildlife Biology and worked on her Masters at Fort Hays State University studying Prairie Chicken in the hybrid zone.

# New Director for Audubon of Kansas

Ron Klataske, Executive Director of Audubon of Kansas since it's founding in 1999, has retired. He has been replaced by Dr. Jackie Augustine. Originally from Wisconsin, she received her undergraduate degree from Miami University in Ohio, her master's from the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee, and her PhD at K State. Under the supervision of Brett Sandercock, she studied Greater Prairie Chicken behavior. Since 2009 she has taught at Ohio State Lima, and has been studying the Greater/Lesser Prairie-Chicken hybrid zone

in Gove and Trego Counties of Kansas. Most recently she studied whether males can tell the difference between females of their own species and the other species (and if they care).

She is active in Audubon in her local chapter, Tri-Moraine Audubon, serving as speaker coordinator and on the board. She worked with South Science Technology Magnet, a public school in Lima, OH, that serves a diverse student body that is 60% minority. She worked with teachers to develop a curriculum where students learned which native plants are hosts to particular native caterpillars, received a



grant from National Audubon to fund the planting of a native plant school garden. She also worked to reorganize the statewide Council of Ohio Audubon Chapters (COAC), eventually becoming president. She acted as a resource for chapters, supplying presentations, connect chapters with presenters, referring chapters to resources

from National Audubon, and providing advocacy or strategic planning training. For AOK, she brings a new perspective, and will push the organization to think about why AOK does what it is doing. What can be changed to make more of an impact? She would like to see a stronger connection between AOK and the Audubon chapters in Kansas. Additionally, she would like to explore what chapters would like from AOK so that the relationship is truly cooperative and not unidirectional.



Nest sites are Federally protected so spotting scopes will be a safe distance from the nest. Meet us for a view of the eagles anytime between 10 a.m. and noon at Veterans Lake in Arkansas City.
